

Men's Corner

The next Men's Fellowship Breakfast at FBC will be on Saturday, December 2nd at 7:30 AM. Richard Bebel will be sharing his testimony. Below is the testimony of Tim Suhayda from the November breakfast.

On a Sunday morning when I was around 5 years old, I, along with my brothers, was made by our mother to go to Sunday school at the Hilltop Lutheran Church. I remember this distinctly because I did not want to go to church. I wanted to stay home with my agnostic father and do whatever it was that he was doing. At the church, I was thrust into a room with a bunch of other 5 year old captives, and we were instructed by a young woman with brunette hair about someone named "God" and about someone named "Jesus" who for some reason I needed to accept into my heart so that I would not go to some place called "Hell." We were told to bow our heads and pray to accept Jesus into our hearts. However, as a child I took this to be literally a physical event, and so a skeptic was born.

I was still made to go to church every Sunday whether I believed anything or not. About the time I turned 8 years old my mother stopped taking us to church for some reason. I was indifferent to spiritual things.

I suspect that after that initial attempt to get me saved was unsuccessful, God decided a little more convincing would be needed to overcome my skepticism. When I was about 13 years old I was in the Boy Scouts. Our troop went on a camping trip to Old Man's Cave in the Hocking Hills of Ohio. A number of us began scaling cliffs. On the cliff there was a ledge that we all needed to traverse. It was quite narrow at a point and 30 feet off of the ground. I lost my grip on the wall and began to fall backward. At that moment I felt a powerful hand on my back push me up against the wall with power and held me there till I recovered my grip. I turned my head to the left to thank the scout behind me, but he was two arms lengths away from me—impossible to reach me. I think the shock of the realization that someone or something unseen had saved my life scared me worse than falling off the cliff. I pondered this event for a while What unseen hand had saved me and why? Eventually, I came to grips with the reality that there was a spiritual being there that day. And if there was a spiritual being there, there had to be a real Creator of the spiritual being.....God? And if there was a real creator God, then there must be a real Jesus, a real heaven, and a real hell. I became interested in spiritual matters, and a fear of my eternal destiny came on me. The skeptic was dead, but I was dead spiritually in sin.

Years later, I met a "born again" Christian while attending the Ohio Institute of Technology. Randal was optimistic and happy. A picture of Jesus. One couldn't help but like him. He exuded Jesus all the time. But the truth of what he was saying made no sense to me. I thought I was a good Christian because I went to my own church.

Following graduation from OIT, I began my electronics career working for 3M as a copy machine repairman. After a service call at a Baptist church on Karl Road, the pastor there asked if I was a "born again" Christian. He asked if I was saved. So I answered that I went to church. I can't remember what else he said but I do remember being offended and feeling that he was right, and I was sure I was going to hell.

Not long after the pastor's witness at the Baptist church, I was laid off from my job with 3M. I looked for a job for 9 months. During this time, I began to listen to Christian radio stations. I liked listening to all the great preachers of the day like J. Vernon McGee, Charles Swindoll, John MacArthur, and, my favorite, Dr. Charles Stanley.

Listening to these great men of faith and their constant explanations of the Gospel and real Christian life, the Holy Spirit's conviction of my lost condition began to get through. I was depending upon good works rather than faith alone in the finished work of Jesus Christ at the cross. One evening in December 1983, after listening to Dr. Charles Stanley give a message about "Why Christ Came," he gave an invitation to accept Jesus Christ as my Savior. I submitted to the Holy Spirit's conviction and prayed asking God to forgive my sin of unbelief, and I accepted Jesus Christ as my Savior. At that moment, I was transferred from the domain of darkness to the Kingdom of Light at 23 years of age.

We see others who are looking for acceptance from their friends for the hope of love. We have cried with a few over their lost innocence and for the promise of love. The world offers plenty of instant happiness instead of real joy and a whole lot of fake love. We see little ones get dropped off for the "free babysitting" during VBS or AWANA. We know they only hear of Jesus in this place and maybe only feel real affection here.

Christmas is a busy time, but as we were recently reminded: no matter the season, let's do what our church does best—truly loving on the lost. There are plenty of opportunities to help with

children of all ages here. Some may be waiting for us to show them the true meaning of Christmas.
