And if things went well, it could be six weeks straight. For a youngster, this was not good. However, I did see some of our country neighbors get saved. Their marriages took on a renewal commitment. Many quit drinking and fighting. Others started showing up in church for the first time and were baptized. The baptisms were outside in the creek. Sometimes they had to break the ice for those new converts. That was my favorite part.

Revivals have other names. Sam Lawless, one of our long-time members, died at the age of 101. He was converted as a young man in a *protracted meeting*. Another name for revival is a *crusade*. D.L. Moody, Billy Sunday, and Billy Graham were famous for *evangelistic crusades*, where people were saved by the thousands. *Awakening* is another historical name for revival. Preachers associated with great awakenings are John Wesley, George Whitefield, and Jonathan Edwards.

King David spoke of his need for revival: "will you not revive us again?" Ps. 85:6.

Then again he said: "I have been anointed with fresh oil." Ps. 92:10.

I have been a Christian since I was seventeen, and over the years I have felt the need for a personal revival: a fresh anointing of the Spirit or a closer walk with God. This January and February will you join Pastor Earley and myself as we seek a time of refreshing, which is the road to Revival? This can be the highest point in your Christian walk. Let God revive your faith, your spirit, and your relationship with Christ.



I hope my tale of a broken boot lace will be more interesting than a talk about New Year's Resolutions. I of the latter.

I broke a boot lace at my tentmaking job last week. To my shame, I saw it coming and didn't act sooner. I noticed it was fraying the last few times I laced up my boots, but I didn't tend to it until I had to. "Had to" meant I had to tie the broken lace parts together to make it through the day.

But if I had just replaced the frayed lace with a new one when I first noticed it beginning to fray, I would still have had problems. If we are honest with ourselves, sometimes the problems in our lives are due to our own sin. And until we deal with our sin, we are not getting to the root of the problem.

The Apostle James tells us to confess our sins to one another and to pray for one another, that we may be healed (James 5:16). Do you know where a great place to do that is? In your Life Group.

I guess I do have something to say about New Year's Resolutions after all. Are you in a Life Group? How about making a New Year's Resolution to join one this January? Your Life Group members can even help you keep that resolution.

Hardy Rubber trees have long, thin, glossy, dark leaves. The foliage appears to glimmer in the moonlight or when lit from above. The leaves change to a paler green in the fall.

The water fountains located in the two ponds on the FBC campus were taken in for service and have been stored for the winter.

The Upward playing field was spread with fertilizer in preparation for winter. Volunteers have installed wooden boards under the runner of the new bleachers enabling them to be moved without tearing up the sod.

A new battery back-up sump pump was installed at the King's Kids Day Care.

The yard care equipment has been serviced and ready for next season. The snow equipment is ready for the winter season. The pick-up truck had an attachment installed at each end of the snow plow blade to aid in plowing snow more efficiently.

Christmas lights were arranged on the trees along the driveway and the nativity scene was completed.

Men's Corner

The next Men's Fellowship Breakfast at FBC will be on Saturday, January 6th at 7:30 AM. Thom Burbridge will be sharing his testimony. Below is the testimony of Richard Bebel from the December breakfast.

I grew up in a small town in New York called Owego. I have two brothers and a sister and all four of us have accepted Jesus Christ as our Lord and Savior. My mom and dad didn't accept Jesus until mom was in her late 40's and dad in his early 60's.

We were brought up by moral values and went to church on special holidays and Christmas. As I think back over my life, I always believed in God. As a young kid I almost drowned in a deep creek near our house, and a lady scooped me up as I was going down. But I never saw her again. Also as a kid, I was hit by a car on Main Street but was not injured. I always believed in God.

As a teenager, I hung around with the wrong crowd in school. I started to drink and smoke, got kicked off the wrestling team, did some other stupid things, and was asked to leave the school for a week.

My dad was a manager at a bottled gas company, and I worked with him during school and a year after. One day I was driving a truck and was hit on the side. I rolled the truck a few times. I had 100 pound cylinders in the truck. I climbed out of the passenger door window unharmed, and not one cylinder exploded. I knew God was with me. Another time, I was bleeding the gas out of a tank and unscrewed the valve. Because of the pressure, I heard and felt the valve miss my head and dented the roof 25 feet above me. God was with me.

One day I met one of my mom's friends. Ted was talking about how to be saved and that I needed to accept Jesus Christ as my personal Lord and Savior. We talked, and I told him I'd be in church that Sunday. Well, that Sunday I did go forward and asked Jesus into my life, but being a full gospel church, I needed the Holy Spirit. The way they were talking made me feel uncomfortable, and I didn't go back. I felt Ted was right that I would need Jesus in my life to have eternal life. So a few weeks later, I went to another church and went forward to ask Jesus to come into my life but was told I needed to speak in tongues and that didn't feel right. I soon went to a Nazarene church and went forward, but there I could lose my salvation when I sinned, and that didn't feel right.

After visiting with family in Florida, I decided to stay and began working in construction. I got along with my supervisors and was promoted from within. I was eventually transferred to another section of the Florida Turnpike where I got my hand caught in the bull gear. This injury forced me out of the workforce for eleven months. The first question that came out of my mouth was, "Why God?"

Eventually, after surgeries, recovery, and fittings of prosthetics, I got a job working at a hotel in Fort Lauderdale as a night auditor. One morning I was awakened by a robber pointing a gun at my stomach. The robber got away with \$100 and left me unharmed. I knew God was with me. Eventually, I was transferred to Dayton, Ohio. Every morning I drove past Far Hill Baptist Church and thought I would attend a service. After going a few times, I joined the singles group. I soon received a call from the pastor, and he asked me if I was saved. I told him I went down the aisle many times and asked Jesus into my life but never felt that "cloud 9" feeling. He asked if I truly accepted Jesus Christ as my Lord and Savior and I said, "I did." He then quoted Ephesians 2:8-9, "For by grace you are saved through faith, and not of yourself, it is a gift of God, not as a result of works, that no one should boast." Finally, I met my wife in a Bible study there, and now 35 years later we are members of First Baptist Church of Grove City.

Thank you for loving me and my children and the pre-school ministry. There is no greater encouragement than to actually feel your prayers. My family is in the midst of some trials and emerging victoriously from others. Every Bible Study and Life Group lesson this year has had this one recurring theme: The struggle is real!

Because the word "struggle" kept coming to mind and surfacing in every single Bible study, Life Group, and personal devotions, I actually looked up the word. **Struggle**: verb. A forceful or violent event to get free of restraint or resist attack. The synonyms of fight, scuffle, brawl, wrestle, fracas, melee were a little over the top I thought. Yet when my own personal battles rage, the hurt is so raw and open that those words don't seem strong enough.

My first taste in any fight is usually bitterness. Someone has wronged me or someone I love, and thoughts of revenge begin to form. Of course, God has put people in my life who, after denying my request to form a posse and go after those who hurt me, remind me that God says, "See to it...that no root of bitterness springs up," and "If you forgive other people when they sin against you, God will also forgive you."

If my circumstances are stealing my joy, I feel hopeless. Yet, once again, I am encouraged to put my hope in the God of David and always, always, say or think "once again, I will praise Him, my Savior and my God."

I know that I am not alone in this. If you believe you are the only person who struggles, please put down this newsletter and RUN to our Life Group kiosk. We all need to start this year knowing we are loved—and maybe not by the people who *should* love and treat us well. Yet, we are loved by the One who adopted us as His very own.

Sometimes I forget that. How great to be a part of a church family who reminds me.
