My two sisters were at the heart of the hurricane in Ft. Myers and Naples, Florida. Sharon's sister lives close to Venice. We were very concerned for their homes but mostly for their personal well-being. While the devastation in Florida was massive, it was much less destructive than predicted. The homes of so many were spared. Those in our church family, as well as our immediate family, are safe. My sisters now have their electricity restored.

The prayers of God's people really made a difference. Just about everyone prays during crisis, but not everyone gives thanks for answered prayers after the storm. Many just credit coincidence that the storm turned toward Orlando and lost energy going over land rather than the coast line. Someone once said, "When I pray, coincidences happen, but when I don't pray, coincidences don't happen."

Sharon and I credit God's answers to prayers for protection over our family during the hurricane. We were constantly texting our sisters as they were hunkered down waiting for the storm. It is such a blessing to witness their fear turn into praise.

May our church become more dependent on prayer than ever before. There is a world of people in our community going through storms of much more intensity than a hurricane: storms caused by drugs, alcohol, promiscuity, and emptiness. Pastor Earley and I are praying for a revival. Revival in the church brings people with problems to God, the problem solver. Fox News and CNN are not going to provide 24-hour coverage for those people's storms. We are the ones to identify them and call out to God on their behalf.

Wouldn't it be great if your brothers or sisters could be delivered from the storms of life?

### **Trustee Ministry Report**

Transitioning from summer into autumn has resulted in a flurry of activity for the Trustees.

The new 15-passenger bus purchase was presented and approved at the Quarterly Business Meeting. The Trustees have placed the order for the new bus which includes the comprised specifications required by FBC and KKDC. The church will take possession of the new bus in approximately three months.

Both 15-passenger vans have been serviced for the winter. The Chevrolet 15-passenger van's bent bumper was repaired and new tires were put on the front of the Ford van. The pick-up truck has been serviced for the winter; the rusted bumper was replaced to ease the procedure of mounting the salt spreader, and the rocker-panel in each door had the rusted edges covered to ensure added safety when used.

The area along the creek, where the brush had been removed from under the trees, was sprayed with brush killer. Along the south side of the creek an area was seeded and fertilized following the removal of a pile of brush and top soil. The flower beds have been winterized around the campus for fall and winter.

I bicycled out to Battelle-Darby Creek Park a few weeks ago. As I was traveling west theconnection along Kropp Road just before it intersects with Lukens Road, I noticed something unusual

about the corn fields on the right side of the road. The stalks were all tall, well over 6 feet, except for one small patch. In this one patch, the stalks were not over 2 feet tall. As I passed by, I noticed there was standing water in that area. Hmmm. Could there be a connection between the standing water and those stunted corn stalks?

Corn needs rain. We were blessed to have a summer with lots of it. But the roots of corn stalks, or any plant for that matter, also need oxygen. Too much water, especially standing water in a field, will drown the roots of a plant and deprive it of the oxygen it needs. I suspect that little patch probably accumulates water after every rainfall. Over the summer, that was enough to stunt the growth of the stalks.

A Life Group principle comes to mind. Sometimes we may not want or feel a need to attend our Life Group. Things may be going well for us. Some unexpected events may come up and make a claim on our time. But, maybe someone else needs us to be there for them?

Like the cornstalks stunted in their growth for lack of oxygen, if we don't faithfully attend our Life Group, some of our brothers and sisters may be stunted in their spiritual growth because of our absence. They'll miss the love, concern, encouragement, and prayer support they need to grow in Christ. Gosh. I don't want to be guilty of keeping my brothers and sisters in Christ from growing spiritually. How about you?

# Men's Corner

I was born and raised in Scott County, Indiana, a long, long time ago. When I was born, my parents lived in a little town called Blocher, but when I was around five, they bought a house in Lexington Township and they owned that house until the passing of my dad, twelve years ago next month.

One of the events that stuck with me when I was around seven, was when a lady by the name of Mrs. Lynch would come by our house on Sunday and take us kids in the neighborhood to the Methodist Church in Blocher. I can remember making crafts out of popsicle sticks and hearing about Jesus. As I grew older, I started working on the farms in the area, mowed yards and didn't think about church.

My wife and I met in high school. Dad paid me five dollars to ask her out on a date. We went together to our junior prom and when she didn't see me all summer, between our junior and senior years, she broke up with me.

When we came here to visit the kids, we came to church with them and when we finally moved here, we really enjoyed the music and thought the preaching wasn't too bad either so we made this our church.

Now that I'm getting to retirement age, I am planning to enjoy the grandbabies even more and all my hobbies, which are woodworking, golf, playing my musical instruments and studying the Bible.
